Assisted Dying Bill

Both Westminster and Scottish Parliaments are shortly proposing to introduce a bill legalising assisted suicide. In many countries this legislation has been passed for use by those with terminal illness in its final stages. However, in practice this has then been challenged as unfair and broadened to include e.g. chronic illnesses and disabilities. Please contact your local MP and MSP and

St Columba's and St Peter's, Edinburgh Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time — Year B 27 October - 3 November 2024

In Mark's mind Jesus is the one who brings salvation to Israel. His healings are a sign of the coming of the Kingdom, and of the fulfilment of the prophecies.

The story of Bartimaeus is as much a call story as a healing story. The expression 'followed him along the road' doesn't simply mean that he joined the crowd on the road to Jerusalem. There can be no doubt what Mark intends: Bartimaeus followed Jesus on the way of Christian discipleship.



It seems that the story was used in the early church as an encouragement to believers and would-be believers. Bartimaeus served as a model for those who are spiritually blind and whose lives lack direction. Keenly aware of his need and his helplessness, he places his hope in Jesus and is not disappointed. In the same way, through faith in Jesus, they can have purpose, energy and direction in their lives. An enthusiastic following of Jesus results in a happy and fulfilled life.

Last week we had a Clergy in-service for priests in Gillis. The speaker, David Wells, is a well known Adult Educator. He offered five aspects of ministry in the church at the present time:

Encounter: we are a people of faith and it is our encounter with the Lord, in the power of the Holy Spirit, that we want to share. When we are able to do that we embark on a journey of encounter that can change our lives.

Missionary discipleship: The programme of Jesus is "a heart that sees". This heart sees where love is needed and acts accordingly. *Deus Caritas Est 31b*. The missionary disciple needs to go into the world and bring the joy of the Gospel.

Evangelisation: I am a mission on this earth; that is the reason I am here in this world. We have to regard ourselves as sealed, even branded, by this mission of bringing light, blessing, enlivening, rising up, healing and freeing. *Evangeli Gaudium 273*. The tonic for the ills of the world is the Good News of the Gospel.

Accompaniment: is the invitation to walk with people. In life we are not always sure how things will unfold. However we are confident that in the midst of life is where God is made manifest.

Synodality: is the desire to allow the Holy Spirit to direct and guide our work of spreading the Gospel. It is the conscious effort of trying to listen to all the difference voices and find a spirt-filled way forward.

SVDP collection: last Sundays of month at St. Columba's (when no special collection). After discussion at the Parish Pastoral Council we've decided that once a month we'll help communities in need via our neighbouring SVDP cluster (St Catherine/St John Vianney's/St Gregory's). They've got great initiatives in the south east of the city supporting the needy and are very proactive. Their President, Jane Watson, will report regularly on how the funds are used. We'll also support the Missionaries of Charity in their work in the city centre.

Recently both parishes paid their annual assessments to the Archdiocese:

- St Columba's. General assessment of 17% of Offertory income £9,405 and Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund assessment (12%) £6,638. Total £16,043
- **St Peter's.** General assessment of 18% of Offertory income £12,302 and Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund assessment (14%) £9,568. Total £21,870

Damian's highlights from Edinburgh

Damian Kikta SAC, a Seminarian from Warsaw, who joined us in July for four weeks study of the English language shares below his views and thanks.

I love to travel. Seeing a number of different places makes me so happy and astonishing—how huge is the richness of cultures and traditions? So, when my supervisors told me that I'm going to Scotland to learn English, I was very thankful because I always wanted to see this country. A the British/Scottish style of living. I was looking forward to seeing Scotland not only to practice my language skills but also to enjoy sightseeing.

My supervisors and Fr. Peter Krakowiak SAC organised for me to have accommodation at St. Peter's Parish, thankfully with Canon Kenneth Owens, who became my host for the five weeks of my Edinburgh adventure. But when I've heard I'll be living at a Scottish parish with no Poles, I've started to feel a little bit scared. What if I couldn't communicate with Fr. Kenneth face-to-face? What if my English is too bad to understand? What if the Scottish accent will be too difficult for me? Hopefully my first contact with Fr. Kenneth started to make me calm. I was understanding a majority of his emails!

But I became completely calm when I arrived in Edinburgh and went to my room at St. Peter's parish house. Canon Kenneth is a great host! He took care of all of my needs. He has been for me like a father, and I've felt like at home. Communication was very easy, and Fr. Kenneth was helping me to improve my language skills. At school I've learnt a number of very useful things (from grammar to lexical subjects), and I met there wonderful people from the whole world with whom I could share good and bad times at school.

Edinburgh is a wonderful city! It's perfect to live there! Approach to the sea and hills made me excited! I wanted to visit all the beautiful things and I think I did about 90% of everything. I really was enjoying every trip in Edinburgh and out of this gorgeous city. After every classes I've

visiting a new place every day.

The biggest astonishment I've experienced was at the parish. As a liturgist, I've had an idea of the churches in western Europe: empty temples, bad liturgy, priests who serve the world, not Christ. I had huge worries. All the things have changed during the mass for the St. Peter and Paul vigil. I saw the living church! The community, which can pray, which respects the liturgy, which can experience God in the liturgy, and after that can meet each other and year before I've been to London, so I had an imagination of celebrate the parish feast. That's what I miss in Poland: the living community, the real Body of Christ, in which participants aren't the "Sunday Catholics." but they meet each other for worshipping God in the Eucharist and for coffee and discussions. I was delighted to be with St. Peter's and St. Columba's parishioners for these 5 weeks. I really appreciate every opportunity to talk with you, to drink coffee, to meet with you at your homes and be with
