

This works continues and tells us some of the uniqueness of human life and how different people deal with the reality of death.

Praying our goodbyes (Ave Maria Press, 1988) by Joyce Rupp offers a spiritual and faith perspective about dealing with loss and dying.

While it is a book about farewell to our loved ones who have died, it is also about many other forms of goodbye in our lives, all those events and experience where we feel a deep sense of loss.

She discovered for the Christian, hello always follow goodbye in some form if we allow it. There is, or can be, new life, although it will be different from the life we knew before. The resurrection of Jesus and the promises of God are too strong to have it any other way.

While focusing on the spiritual aspect of loss, Rupp maintains a sound theological and psychological grounding. She bases her reflections on scripture and treats a number of things: the "ache" common to humankind, how to identify particular aches, attitudes to suffering, Jesus and goodbyes, the life of "pilgrims" and the freedom of letting go.

Each chapter concludes with probing questions and the book ends with 24 prayer experiences incorporating images, symbols and rituals as sources of strength and healing.

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
