St Columba's and St Peter's, Edinburgh Solemnity of Christ the King —Year B 24 November —1 December 2024

The gospel, where the Lectionary once again shifts to ^o John, contains a section from the passion narrative. There is no doubt but that Jesus was crucified on the charge of being a messianic pretender. The title `King of the Jews' posted on the cross makes that clear. In our passage Jesus is being interrogated by Pilate. The issue here is the nature of Jesus' kingship. Jesus declares that he is indeed a king, but not the kind of king the world understands. Jesus has come into the world as the bearer of divine revelation. Fulfilling that role is what being king means to him. This refutes recent attempts to portray Jesus as a political revolutionary.

On Friday we prayed for the repose of the soul of Fr. Gordon Brown who was with us here in St Peter's for many years. We give thanks for his example and priestly ministry.


Fr. Brown was ordained to the priesthood at St. Mary's Cathedral in Edinburgh on 1 March 1969. He was a professor at St Andrew's College in Drygrange (the Archdiocesan seminary) from 1970 - 77, and then became its rector from 1977 - 84. He served in several parishes across the Archdiocese and is remembered as an intelligent, gentle and kind man.

Helping Children Understand Death

Death is a fantasy topic that arises in drama, story, cartoon, or part of games - even peek-o-boo is a derivative of the Old English game of "Alive or dead."

Children's pets die, and so do their grandparents, neighbours and friends. They begin to detect early that some things go away, but can come back and some things, like people, go away and never come back, and some cannot come back - the differences are confusing.

The notion of death is a natural one which is covered over with emotional meanings which children acquire from adults - there is no automatic trauma or psychological danger for children unless the adults cannot handle it.

The way death is perceived has a great deal to do with the intellectual/cognitive capabilities of the child and the emotional life of the child.

For example, in the early years of 4-6, children are rather literal about the issue and language. Where did they put Grandpa? They put his body in a casket and they buried him. Then, where did they put his head? Or, if Grandpa went to his final rest, when will he finish?

How can I protect my child's mental health following the death of a loved one?

Here are some important ways you can help your child feel better and protect their mental health:

- Continue to provide the child with loving and consistent care from you, a parent, relative or carer, whom they trust and know well.
- Infants and young children continue to feel secure and loved through loving physical contact, singing, cuddling and rocking.
- Normal life routines and structure are maintained as much as is possible. Try to keep a regular pattern to the day with time for activities, such as cleaning, schoolwork, exercise and play.
- If children display challenging and/or regressive

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behaviour, try to understand it is their way of showing what they cannot verbalise, and do not punish them.

Ensure that other children in the child's life are informed through their teachers or parents about what happened, so that they can support the child on their return to school.

Remember to also take care of your own physical and mental wellbeing. You are grieving as well. It can be hard to support your children while dealing with your own feelings, which is why it is very important that you take time for yourself and take care of yourself.

You cannot help your children if you are unwell. Get sufficient sleep, eat properly, exercise, take time to relax (for example through listening to music) and also have someone to whom you can turn to for emotional support.
