St Columba's and St Peter's, Edinburgh Feast of the Holy Family —Year C 29 December 2024—12 January 2025

Holy Family 29 December 2024

This tells the story of how the 12 year old Jesus got lost in Jerusalem. The incident shows the love Mary and Joseph had for Jesus. Afterwards Jesus went down to Nazareth with Mary and Joseph and obeyed them. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience (Heb. 5:8).

We are inclined to say that Jesus got lost in the temple. It would be true to say that he began to find himself in the temple. Here the boy Jesus calls God his Father - this is the core of the story. And here he begins to show his wisdom, a



wisdom that amazes those who hear him. This anticipates the kind of amazement at his teaching that will mark his ministry. In Luke's infancy narrative, Mary is the only adult who will last into the public ministry and even into the beginnings of the Church. She is presented to us as a model Christian believer.

The Epiphany of the Lord 5 January 2025

For Matthew, the story of the Magi becomes an anticipation of the fate of the good news of salvation, a fate that he knew in the aftermath of the resurrection.

God revealed himself to the Jews through the Scriptures, and to the Gentiles through nature. Hence, Matthew shows the Magi, who were Gentiles, receiving a revelation through astrology. The story highlights the paradox: the Jews who have the Scriptures reject Jesus, while Gentiles come and, with the help of the Scriptures, find and adore Him. There is nothing to be gained by speculating where the Magi came from and what exactly the star was. The star was merely the means by which the great mystery was revealed - the revelation of Christ as the saviour of the Gentiles too.

Many thanks to all who helped to prepare both our churches for the Christmas liturgies. Over our four Christmas Masses we were able to celebrate the birth of the Christ child and to pray for peace in our world.

The Church in her liturgy continues to move us forward. In celebrating the feast of the Holy Family we enter into the story of Jesus' life. In the solemnity of the Epiphany we acknowledge that Jesus is the Messiah that was prophesied of old.

In St. Mary's Cathedral in Edinburgh, and in all cathedrals around the world, on the feast of the Holy Family this year Pope Francis has asked that a wooden cross be placed for veneration during the Jubilee Year - Pilgrims of Hope. We hope to have a walking pilgrimage to the cathedral probably sometime after Easter. We can say Mass at the shrine, pray the Jubilee prayer before the cross and have a cup of tea or coffee in the cafe. There will also be the option of going by bus and meeting the parish group in the Cathedral.



Mike Mineter from the Archdiocese Justice and Peace Commission attended the meeting and pointed us to the 2009 Kairos Palestine Document, a call to action. We should be aware of Christian Zionism – and ready to undermine it. Those attending the meeting gave a donation to CAFOD who are working with Christian, Jewish, Muslim and secular partners in the Occupied Palestinian Territory and Israel to tackle humanitarian crises and protect human rights.



Haneen Zoabi, a Palestinian-Israeli politician from Nazareth, served as a member of the Israeli Knesset (parliament) for the Balad party from 2009-2019. 25 people attended the talk to hear Haneen's stark appraisal of the current conflict and its background from the Palestinian perspective, as well as her insights into the requirements for a fair and lasting future peace in Palestine.

She believes firmly that those responsible for oppression must be held accountable, for the sake of their own humanity as well as Palestinian humanity, and that love requires accountability before there can be any just or

The Feast of the Epiphany of Our Lord

The feast of the Epiphany of Our Lord commemorates when Jesus Christ was revealed as the Messiah. The Gospel of Matthew recounts that three wise men from the East visited our Saviour after his birth and acknowledged him with gifts representing kingship, priesthood, and death.

The Feast of the Epiphany highlights key themes in the story of Jesus and the visit of the Magi. These themes help us understand the importance of Jesus' birth and His mission for all people:

- Jesus as Light: Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness. He guides all people to God.
- Universal Mission: Jesus came for all nations and people. His salvation is not limited to one group.
- Fulfilment of Prophecy: Isaiah's prophecy about light and gifts is fulfilled in Jesus. The gifts of the Magi show this connection.

- Jesus as Light: Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness. He guides all people to God.
- Universal Mission: Jesus came for all nations and people. His salvation is not limited to one group.
- Fulfilment of Prophecy: Isaiah's prophecy about light and gifts is fulfilled in Jesus. The gifts of the Magi show this connection.
- **Humility and Kingship:** Jesus is a humble king. He shows true power through love and gentleness.
- Inclusiveness: Paul teaches that both Jews and Gentiles share in Jesus' promises. The Epiphany shows that everyone is included in God's plan.
- **Guidance of the Star:** The star leads the Magi to Jesus. This shows God's guidance to all who seek Him.
- **Gift-Giving:** The Magi bring gifts to honour Jesus. This shows recognition of His kingship and divinity.
- Contrast with Herod: Herod's fear and violence contrast with Jesus' humble birth. This shows the difference between earthly and heavenly kingship.
